We all met the following DAS dogs:



DALMATIANS AND HEALTH

Focus in this newsletter is on Epilepsy

Epilepsy is a general term for neurological disorders that are characterized by recurrent seizures (fits) Some dogs can have seizures which are caused by trauma, toxins, brain tumour, infection or an issue with the dogs blood, kidneys or other organs. However, the majority of dogs have idiopathic epilepsy which means there are is no known cause

Dogs with idiopathic epilepsy typically have their first seizures between the ages of 6 months and 6 years and whilst it can occur in any breed, there are some breeds that have had a genetic basis identified. Obviously it would be unwise to use dogs with this for breeding.

Dalmatians are not identified as one of the breeds with genetic predisposition. The following breeds are: Labrador and Golden Retrievers, Poodles, Dachshunds, Cocker Spaniels, Irish Setters, German Shepherds and Beagles

Seizures fall into 2 categories:

- 1 Generalised or Grand Mal Seizures. This type of seizure appear as involuntary jerking or twitching of all 4 limbs with a loss of consciousness
- 2 Partial or Focal seizures. These involve one limb, one side of the body or face but may progress to a generalised one

Seizures may also result in abnormal behaviour, salivation, chomping/chewing and involuntary urination and defecation.

There are 3 distinct phases to the seizure

Aural phase – here behaviour may change, this can be subtle, but they may be restless, attention seeking or display anxious behaviour

Ictal phase – here the seizure occurs and may last a few seconds, few minutes or longer

Post Ictal phase – here the dog begins to recover but may be disorientated, restless, uncoordinated as the effects wear off

Diagnosis is made by the vet who will listen to the history and may do more tests before commencing medication.

Epilepsy cannot be cured but medication can help with controlling the seizures

What to do if your dog has a seizure

It can be very upsetting and frightening to see your dog have a seizure. Try to remain calm and ensure your dog is safe. Move things that may be around so that no injuries are caused during the seizure. If possible, try to video the seizure and make a note of the time, so you will know how long it lasts. This will help the vet

Make the area calm, turn off TV, lights etc, try not to touch them but talk to them calmly so they know you are there, - they can still hear you Be prepared for any loss of control of bladder or bowels.

If your vet has given you medication in case the seizure lasts longer, be prepared to give it If this is the first seizure then once it is over ring the vet for further advice

Prolonged seizures lasting more than 5 minutes or two or more consecutive seizures without full recovery are referred to as status epilepticus. You should seek immediate veterinary advice. Two or more seizures in 24 hours are referred to as cluster seizures and are an indication for beginning anti-seizure medication

Hydrotherapy



Does your dog have stiff back legs, finding it difficult to get up? Recovering from joint surgery?

A couple of DAS dogs, Bradley and Haribo have issues with their back legs and so attend hydrotherapy every week. They work hard in the water and Sue says it has improved their mobility so much. I think they are rewarded with a sausage when they have finished so I am sure they love that!!

Hydrotherapy uses the properties of water — buoyancy, viscosity, resistance, and hydrostatic pressure — to enable a dog (or human) to move their joints. Water makes the body buoyant, so when submerged, the weight of the body is supported. This means the dog is not fighting gravity. The buoyancy of water reduces stress on the joints and this creates a much safer environment for recovery after surgery.

Hydrotherapy is also beneficial for dogs who are recovering from an injury, dogs who suffer from degenerative joint disease, and those who have been paralyzed.

Water therapy can also help dogs suffering from fractures, hip dysplasia, the amputation of a limb, and neurological disorders. Hydrotherapy may be especially beneficial for dogs who suffer from arthritis due to old age; the warm water helps reduce joint swelling.

Benefits of Hydrotherapy

Simultaneously, water therapy stimulates, strengthens and relaxes the body. Water therapy may also improve balance, coordination, and increase overall energy levels, all while reducing pain and stress. Water increases circulation, ideal for skin and coat, can increase lymph drainage, rid the body of toxins and improve the immune system. Water can also encourage better digestion and promote balance and co ordination as well as being a low impact exercise which helps with weight loss and general fitness

Adopting a Spot

DAS is UK based and only rehomes in UK. If you are interested in adopting from DAS:- Visit the website and download an adoption form, these can be located at the top of each page or underneath the dogs for adoption. Once this is completed and returned and all is ok then you will receive a call from a volunteer who will visit you to complete a home check. If all is approved then wait for a suitable dog. Of course, you can also chat with Sue too. It is important to understand that some rescue dogs require a lot of patience and time as they may have been traumatised by situations they have been in prior to rescue. They need commitment and love to help them adjust to their new home. If this is the case then you will be given as much information as possible. It is important to recognise that it may take many months. However, DAS is always available for help, advice and support.







CARROT BITES

Ingredients

250g Wholemeal flour
125g Oatmeal
125g Porridge oats
150ml Sunflower/Almond oil
2 Lightly beaten eggs
200 g Grated carrots
1 tsp Carraway seeds
1 tbsp Finely chopped parsley

Method

Sift flour and mix together with porridge oats and oatmeal.

Make well in centre, add oil, beaten eggs then carrots, caraway seeds and parsley.

Mix well until you have a sticky dough.

Knead on floured surface until smooth then roll out to 7mm thick.

Cut out biscuits shapes, place onto lined baking tray and bake for around 50 mins until crisp and golden Allow to cool

CHEDDAR & ROSEMARY BITES

Ingredients

225g Coconut/rice flour
50g Grated cheddar cheese
120ml Unsweetend Almond
milk
1 tsp Rosemary




Method
